

### The Human Eco-Predicament: Overshoot and the Population Conundrum

The continuity of civilization will require a cooperative, planned contraction of both the material economy and human populations, starting with a personal to civilizational transformation of fundamental values, beliefs, assumptions, and attitudes underpinning our neoliberal/capitalist industrial society.



### Humans vs. Nature: Our Long and Destructive Journey to the Age of Extinction

The story of the biodiversity crisis starts with a cold-case murder mystery that is tens of thousands of years old. When humans started spreading across the globe they discovered a world full of huge, mythical-sounding mammals called "megafauna", but by the end of the Pleistocene, one by one, these large animals had disappeared. Evidence from ancient crime scenes is patchy but what investigators have learned suggests a prime suspect: humans.



## The Global Push for Population Growth Shows We're Not Grappling With the Climate Crisis

Progress is being undone by growth, especially as the climate crisis deepens. In all of the news surrounding Vladimir Putin, it might have been easy to overlook that he had recently revived a Soviet-era policy <u>called the "Mother Heroine" award</u>, which goes to women who bear 10 or more children, offering financial incentives and other benefits in a bid to spur population growth. He is not alone.

#### The Great Simplification – Jon Erickson: "Illusions, Power and the Political Economy"


