



Book Preview: Random Homeostasis - On the Nature of Contingent Reality

The new book by Jane Gray Morrison and Michael Tobias, and the first comprehensive exploration of theoretical biology in the context of hybrid, realtime evolution within an ethical and philosophical context. The book focuses on global biodiversity conservation from the perspectives of mathematical and phenomenological areas of critical significance, to the crisis of endangered species and habitats, and the well-being - as well as potential extinction - of humankind. A discussion of new landmark theories of ecological imagination, survival ethics, and an altogether original discourse on the nature of Nature.



Paul Ehrlich on Environment, Population and a Lifetime Journey through Science and Politics

Paul Ehrlich's 1968 bestseller *The Population Bomb* generated an enormous amount of concern, controversy, and criticism for its neo-Malthusian predictions

of famine and mass death and was considered a milestone in the 1960s and 1970s environmental movement. The Stanford biologist has remained in the spotlight as a public scientist and institution builder. In this SPHERE podcast, Prof. Ehrlich shares personal experiences and reflects on some central scientific and political issues of his career, engaging with questions related to the environment and governance.

Experts call for 'loss and damage' fund for nature in developing world

Wealthy countries should pay for the loss and damage they cause to nature in poorer countries in the same way as for climate impacts. This is because habitat loss and overexploitation of resources in poor countries are driven by consumption in the global north, researchers argue in a comment piece published in Nature Ecology & Evolution.



Top tips for turning green (or even grey) spaces into nature havens

How you manage your space has a big impact on the variety of plants, insects, and animals that are there. Even if it's predominantly a car park! Imagine the difference if everyone made the patch of land they look after just a bit more nature friendly—or even connected it to a patch of land next door, creating a nature network.

Understanding the connection between women's and children's rights, family planning, and the environmental crisis: While angst about declining global fertility and population is palpable and building, a drop in fertility rates was predictable and predicted for decades. The worst thing about its arrival now is that it's so late in coming.

Shell shareholders urged by LAPFF to back climate activist's resolution

Shell shareholders should support a climate activist resolution at its annual general meeting and vote against the oil major on most counts, Britain's Local Authority Pension Fund Forum (LAPFF) advises. This follows announcements by the <u>Church of England Pension Board</u>, proxy adviser PIRC, and several Dutch funds in favor of the climate resolution proposed by the activist group *Follow This*.
